## **Victory in Europe Day, generally known as VE Day is a day celebrating the formal acceptance by the Allies of World War II of Nazi Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces on the 8 May 1945**

A national holiday was declared and there was dancing in the street and singing although for those who had lost loved ones it was a bittersweet day and many widows did not take part in the jubiliations.

However, British and Commonwealth Armed Forces (The “Forgotten Army”) were still fighting in Burma, Singapore and Thailand, as were the Americans in the Pacific, against an enemy who were fighting under a different moral and ethical code to that fought in Europe. The fighting was bitter, to say the least, and would have been prolonged if the Americans had not dropped the first two atomic bombs on Nagasaki and Hiroshima on 9 August after the Allies had delivered Japan an ultimatum to surrender on 28th July, which was ignored.

Japan surrendered on 15 August (due to time zone differences, 14 August in America).

August 15 is the official VJ Day in the UK (2 September in America, the day the surrender document was signed on the USS Missouri in Japan, signalling the end of World War II).

Over 50,000 UK servicemen were held as Japanese prisoners of war in South East Asia between 1941-1945, of whom twenty-five per cent were either killed or died during captivity. Many working on the infamous Burmese railway.

These brave men felt cruelly overlooked upon their repatriation and beyond.

With few survivors now left, this conflict is fast disappearing from living memory.

However. a petition has been delivered to Parliament who have stated the intention to commemorate VJ Day on 15 August 2020. They are liaising with other organizations, such as The British Legion, as to what form these commemorations will take.

The entries represented the whole gambit of the Show Schedule, The quality of fruit, flowers, produce, handicrafts, photographs and children's entries were of a very high standard and the Sports Hall looked wonderful. Sadly due to weather conditions no large potatoes appeared and cauliflowers were thin on the ground but each year brings its trials to the gardener.

10.15am The last entry had been taken and the doors were closed. The Judges came in to start the long process of judging each entry in the different classes. Once the decisions for 1st 2nd and 3rd were taken, the certificates written and given out, spot of lunch and welcome break and a wait to see if the crowds appear.

2.00pm The doors opened and the people began to arrive to look at the entries and to admire them. The contestants returned. Some elated, others a little bit disappointed, but hopefully most will return with new entries next year.

3.45 pm The prizes were awarded and the Raffle distributed. Whilst all this was going on in the Sports Hall, in the School Hall the caterers provided Tea, Coffee, biscuits and cakes for all. The first Urn was switched on at 7.45 and switched off at 3.45.

6.15 pm The Halls were empty, tables and chairs returned to the WI and the South Cave Committee and Helpers went home exhausted but very pleased with the day. Ready to start again for 2020!

This year the U3A Art Group, Justin Lowe and Rob Leake displayed their talents in the small hall for all to enjoy. So a big Thank you to them.

We were also a venue for two Lifestyle groups who had used their summers to promote their particular interests. The Hoglets in the small hall were working for the preservation of hedgehogs and had taken part in bathing a hedgehog! The stall provided us with a wealth of information about how attract hedgehogs into our gardens. In the main hall the boys were focusing on the problems of litter. They were encouraging us all to pick up 3 pieces of litter a day. They had organised a couple of competitions to take part in.


**The Parish Council have recently refurbished the Lych Gate At South Cave Cemetery which was fully restored in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, the Lych Gate and attached Wall to South Cave Cemetery are Grade II listed. Listing Description: ‘1873-74. Coursed limestone rubble with brick and ashlar dressings, wooden piers and roof with plain tiles. 2 low walls each supporting 2 wooden piers with arch braces to the roof Between 2 wooden gates with quatrefoil panels. Eitherside are curved rubble stone walls with curved brick tops, ending in single square brick piers topped with ashlar pyramidal caps’**

## **Burglary on Brough road**

A burglary was reported to the Facebook group on the 1<sup>st</sup> November, it took place on Brough road at approximately 2 o'clock in the afternoon; the burglar alarm was activated but went quiet after a few minutes. This incident raises the question of what you should do if the home alarm system of one of your neighbours goes off. Such systems rely on someone hearing the alarm and calling the authorities, or on it scaring the criminal or burglar away with the noise alone. The following are some things you should do:

**Observe:** If you hear a home alarm system going off, start by trying to identify the source of the noise. If you are unable to see anything untoward, try to contact your neighbour by phone or text. Continue to observe the house, particularly if the alarm is still sounding.

**Avoid Direct Confrontation:** If you see a suspicious individual near the source of the alarm, it is recommended that you avoid direct confrontation. Try to move into a position to get a good observation and try to keep a safe distance between yourself and the house where the alarm is going off.

**Make Personal Contact with The Homeowner:** Even if the alarm is switched off and there seems to be no signs of trouble, it is still imperative that you follow up. Especially, when you cannot contact your neighbour via phone or text, making a

personal contact with him/her about what happened can make a difference.

**Report to Authorities:** Not reporting minor incidents (such as neighbour's home security alarm going off) is one of the biggest mistakes neighbourhood residents make. If your neighbour's house alarm is sounding and it may seem to you that something suspicious is going on in their home, it is recommended that you report the incident to the police.

### **How to report a crime to the Police**

You can report a crime in several ways:

- If it's an emergency and the crime is still taking place, call **999** and ask for the police.
- **If it's not an emergency, do not call 999.** This doesn't mean the crime is not important, it just helps the police to make the best use of their resources. For non-emergency calls please use 101.
- You can contact Crimestoppers on 0800 555111 if you wish to remain anonymous.

### **How to describe a suspect to the Police**

If you are reporting a crime or suspicious activity you can greatly assist the police by providing an accurate description of the suspect. The police will require as much information as possible in order to identify the individual at a later stage. The A to H method is a simple checklist to help you remember as many details as possible.

A - Age  
B - Build  
C - Colour  
D - Dress  
E - Elevation (height)  
F - Face  
G - Gait  
H - Hair

To remember the details of a suspicious vehicle use the mnemonic SCRIM.

S - Shape  
C - Colour  
R - Registration  
I - Identifying marks/features  
M - Make/Model

### **How to report dog fouling in the street**

Numerous residents have been reporting dog mess left in the streets around the village. In general, it is an offence not to clear up after your dog if it fouls on land in the open air which the public has access to. A person guilty of this offence can be issued with a fixed penalty notice of £75. The dog warden can be contacted: -

You can choose how you receive messages, by either phone or email, how often you want to hear from them and about the issues that matter to you. ### **Neighbourhood Watch**



The Neighbourhood Watch scheme is the largest voluntary movement in England and Wales with around 173,000 coordinators covering 3.8 million households. It's a partnership intended to bring people together to make their communities safer and involves the police, Community Safety departments of local authorities, other voluntary organisations and individuals

and families who ostensibly want to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. It aims to help people protect themselves and their properties and to reduce the fear of crime by means of improved home security, greater vigilance, accurate reporting of suspicious incidents to the police and by fostering a community spirit.



South Cave, Market Place – 08:25 – 09:00 & 15:25 – 16:20

We are looking to recruit friendly and reliable individuals to supervise the safe road crossing of children and adults at various locations across the East Riding.

As part of your role you will be responsible for deciding when it is safe to stop traffic, using the crossing patrol sign, to give clear signals to drivers, cyclists and pedestrians. You may also have some involvement in road safety training delivered to school children.

This is a rewarding and respected role within the community that is appreciated by parents, children and road users. The weekly hours range between 4 - 8 hours which makes this an attractive opportunity for retirees, part time workers, students and self-employed people as it can fit in around other commitments. Applications are welcome from everyone.

You will need knowledge of the Highway Code but you will be provided with full training. You will also be provided with all the equipment required to carry out the role.
